

## OUR AMAZING TRINITARIAN UNIVERSE Pt 1

On the program I would like to talk about the Trinity and how God expresses Himself in the universe in a great variety of awesome ways: God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. For those who question the Trinity, especially Christians, I would recommend that you read Jesus' last command to his apostles before He ascended into Heaven where He told them to baptize all nations in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Of course I admit there can never be a proof for God but if you look at the universe you will see that it is divided up into trinities and in fact, scientists tell us that the universe itself is divided up into time, space and matter. But the really amazing thing is that each of these entities can be applied to one of the divine persons of the Trinity.

We can ascertain the personalities of the Trinity simply by looking at their names. God the Father is like the father in a family. In other words, he is rock solid. He is known for his stability. God the Son is like any youth. He is known for his vitality. And God the Holy Spirit represents the mother in the family and the feminine. Therefore, the Holy Spirit is shrouded in mystery.

So let's take a look at time, space, and matter and see how they reflect the Trinity. Of the three: time, space, and matter, matter is the most solid and therefore represents God the Father. And matter can also be divided into a trinity of solid, liquid and gas. This trinity also represents God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The solid of course represents God the Father or stability. The liquid, being in motion, represents the vitality of God the Son. And of course the gaseous state of matter, being invisible and mysterious, represents God the Holy Spirit.

In the threefold nature of the universe, time would represent God the Son because of course it represents action or movement. And time can be divided into a trinity: past, present, and future and these three entities also represent God as a Trinity. The past is a known factor and therefore represents God the Father. The present is the active state of time and therefore represents God the Son. And the future, being mysterious and unknown, represents God the Holy Spirit, that is the mysterious member of the divine Trinity.

The third divide of the universe is space and since we cannot see space, space represents the Holy Spirit. And the three dimensions of

space are length, width and depth. These three dimensions of space also represents God the Trinity. If we look at length and consider that as a horizontal plane, that would represent stability or God the Father. Width would be in the opposite direction, in other words up and down or vertical. That would represent God the Son, the active member of the Blessed Trinity. And depth would be the front to back dimension. Therefore, we cannot really see the depth. If we visualize length, width, and depth as left to right, up and down, and front to back that point that goes front to back cannot be seen. On a cross, for example, the symbol of Christianity, there is a vertical member, a horizontal member, but also a third member right through the middle front to back. That member is the Holy Spirit.

Of all these trinities, solid, liquid and gas is probably the most interesting and the most familiar because it is expressed also in our surroundings, for example, the earth is made of land, sea and air another solid, liquid, gas trinity. And it's interesting that these symbols for the three divine persons are expressed by creatures that live in these environments, for example, the fish in water symbolizes Jesus. The dove in the air symbolizes the Holy Spirit. And to a lesser degree, the oxen is known as a symbol for God the Father.

It's interesting that in the book of Revelation there is a perverse trinity which also comes out of the land, sea, and air. The beast from the sea is the Antichrist. The beast from the earth is the False Prophet. And the dragon which comes out of the air is of course Satan himself.

Now let's look at some other familiar trinities. I think we're all familiar with the three primary colors: yellow, red and blue. The blue, being cool, calm and collected, represents God the Father. The red, being the most exciting of the three colors, represents God the Son and his youthful vitality. And yellow is the most mysterious of the three colors and represents the Holy Spirit. Again we see these colors symbolized in the Bible when the Holy Spirit came on the apostles, he came as a flame, undoubtedly a flame of yellow. And of course red symbolizes the bloody crucifixion of Jesus. We can see the yellow flame on a candle also, for example, because the candle is used to express prayer. The solid wax represents God the Father. The melting wax represents God the Son, and the yellow flame of the wick, symbolizes God the Holy Spirit.

Now let's look at another familiar trinity. The three primary shapes of sculpture and architecture are the triangle, the circle, and the square.

Again, these three shapes symbolize the Trinity. The triangle is the most dynamic of the three shapes and therefore represents God the Son. The square is the most solid and represents God the Father. The circle is the most mysterious, the most feminine, and represents God the Holy Spirit. From painting and sculpture we now go to music: harmony, melody, and rhythm is the trinity of all music. The melody would represent God the Father, the harmony would be God the Son because God the Son compliments and works with God the Father. The rhythm in this case represents God the Holy Spirit.

And let's look at one more famous trinity. Jesus says, "In the End Times there will be signs in the sun, moon and stars." The sun, moon and stars also represent the Trinity. Contrary to popular belief, the sun represents God the Father. The moon reflects the sun and therefore symbolizes the Son of God who reflects the Father. Also, the moon goes through various phases through the month and that activity is a sign of Jesus Christ. The stars, being very tiny and mysterious, represent God the Holy Spirit.

It should not be surprising to discover that there are also three different kinds of trinities. The trinities we have looked at on this program are the structural trinities and therefore, refer to God the Father. In Part 2 of this series, we will be looking at entirely different kinds of trinities which refer to God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.
